There are also a few poems: "Jenny," by G. D. Rossetti; "One among so Many" and "Aux Ternes," from "Songs of the Army of the Night," by Francis Adams; "The Song of the Shirt," by Tom Hood; "The Cry of the Children," by Mrs. Browning; and "The Fourth Psalm," by Milton. And if you read, in "Fantasias," "My Sister" and "Bogeyland," I should not be offended. The fact is, John, I wish you to be a *Clarionette* as well as a Socialist.
