TOWARDS A NEW SOCIETY

An essay proposing the abolition of the present destructive tax regime and its replacement by a logical and equitable alternative to raise all public tax revenues from a uniform impost on the unimproved capital value of land.

The change would be a catalyst for both economic and social reform to reinstate the most basic of human rights, opening opportunities for employment and wealth creation, freeing initiative, encouraging enterprise, rewarding effort, discouraging land speculation and preventing tax evasion.

The historic failure of society to identify cause and relief for chronic unemployment and poverty is reflected in the increasingly unhappy state of Australian society. Responsibility for that may well be within the tax system which not only inhibits present growth, it endangers the nation's future.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Allen Fairhall completed his trade training only in time to meet the depression of 1929 and long term unemployment. But with self training in electronics and an amateur radio licence he sought, and was finally granted, a licence to build and operate Newcastle's second commercial broadcasting station, 2KO in 1931.

In 1942 he was recruited by the Ministry of Munitions to serve three years in a voluntary capacity as Supervising Engineer of Radio and Signals Supplies in N.S.W.

Joining the Menzies Government in 1949 as member for the newly created seat of Paterson he spent twenty years in the House, eleven of them as Minister, variously of Interior and Works, Supply and Defence. He was awarded the J.N. Kirby medal of the Australian Society of Production Engineers, a D.Sc. (Hon) Newcastle and was invited to Fellowship of the Royal Society.
