

Dear Friend:

The Henry George Memorial Congress will assemble this September in the great American metropolis, the city where Henry George was twice nominated for the office of Mayor and where he died, just thirty years ago in the midst of his second campaign—events which will recall sacred memories.

The Congress of 1927 will gather under the impetus of the new Forward Movement to popularize the Single Tax cause and amidst encouraging evidences of a growing appreciation of the great economic truths proclaimed by Henry George.

The new Australian Single Tax city, Canberra, the notable progress of land value taxation in Denmark, the growing popularity of Pittsburgh's policy of concentrating the burden of taxation upon land values, the interesting experiments of New York City, past and present, with special exemption from taxation for new buildings—these are some of the tendencies of the times which will be featured in reports and discussions of legislative progress.

This convention promises to bring together the most notable group of distinguished Single Taxers that has been assembled in America in many years and, needless to say, the program will be of a high order.

Jakob Lange, able leader of the Georgist movement in Denmark, will tell us the interesting story of the strides Denmark is making in the actual application of the Single Tax principle. Canada, Mexico, and probably England will also be represented by prominent spokesmen.

Among other distinguished speakers whom we can announce at this time are Hon. Charles O'Connor Hennessy, President of the International Union, now on a speaking tour of European countries, Mrs. Anna George de Mille, daughter of Henry George, Hon. Woodbridge N. Ferris, United States Senator from Michigan, Senor Jose M. Bejarano, Secretary of the Mexican Chamber of Commerce, Hon. Frederic C. Howe, former Commissioner of Immigration, who has just returned from a study of conditions abroad, and Hon. Lawson Purdy, a prominent figure in the civic life of New York and widely known as an authority on taxation and assessments.

The program, when completed, will contain the names of many of the most representative leaders in the Single Tax movement, including a number of those intimately associated with Henry George during his memorable campaigns, both political and educational, to advance the cause of economic freedom. And the discussions will deal with problems, policies and methods—matters of practical interest to all single-taxers.

Special memorial exercises at the tomb of Henry George in Greenwood Cemetery will be an impressive feature.

A rare opportunity to meet and greet your fellow workers in the great cause, the men and women who have fought the battles of the Single Tax during four decades. Plan now to go to New York, so you won't miss it.

Please sign and return the enclosed card at once. By doing so you will receive further detailed information and will greatly assist the Convention Committee in the completion of plans to make this Congress a great success.
