Minutes:

The Minutes of the last Executive Meeting held on October 19 1978 were read by the Secretary and unanimously agreed and signed.

The Secretary asked that time be taken at this point for any him to read a letter he had received from Miss Rawson, Canada, criticising the arrangements at the San Francisco conference, particularly as regards the business meeting of the International Union. Several members present had been at San Francisco and concurred with Miss Rawson about much of what she had written. They felt that the heavy timetable with several activities taking place simultaneously and the frequent changes made, had created an atmosphere in which it was very difficult to organise the IU business meeting successfully. The problems that had arisen stemmed largely from the fact that it was a multi-organisation conference over which the IU had no control. It was agreed that since the next conference would be exclusively an IU conference and organised by the International Union and that the business meeting would be attended by a greater; more representative body of members, there would not be the problems encountered at San Francisco. Mr. Bjørner, amongst others, spoke in praise of the extremely well organised and enjoyable IU conferences that had been held in the past at Swanigk, Caswell Bay, Isle of Man, etc.

Venue of the Next Conference

The Secretary said that at the Business meeting in San Francisco Holland had been recommended as the next venue and from the results of the questionnaire sent to all members, it had been the choice of the majority of those who had replied.

In view of these circumstances, it was unanimously agreed that the next I.U. Conference be held in Holland.

On the question of the date of the conference it was agreed that since most IU conferences became the annual family holiday for many, and this holiday often had to coincide with school vacations, the last week in July might be the best date.

A letter from Mr. Sevenster was read to the meeting. He had suggested holding the conference at Bergen - a north-west town in Holland that was near the coast. A Danish folk high-school there might provide suitable inexpensive accommodation for those not wishing to stay at an hotel, with the school providing the meeting rooms. Mrs. Sobrielo was awaiting further information from Mr. Sevenster.

It was agreed that during the week of the conference, one whole day be made available to Dutch Georgeists to organise as they wished - perhaps with a view to gaining publicity in their own country.
