### Messages to the Conference

"I cannot commit myself in advance to cross the Atlantic for the purpose but neither will I refuse, for who knows? Thank you for enrolling me . . . the United Kingdom may be behind the times, as our American friends delight in asserting, but in activity for the cause of Land Value Taxation you certainly take the lead. I have very vivid recollections of the Edinburgh Conference in 1929 and I hope the present one will equal it in outstanding success."—*Senator Arthur W. Roebuck, Toronto.*

"I am striving to come if the matter of visas and the procuring of finance can be managed. Our work here in Berlin is for the time being suspended. But I am able to do something as member now of the editorial staff of the *Tagesspiegel* (the Daily Mirror), the largest German daily paper. This I am sending you now every day in exchange for *Land & Liberty* and the *Manchester Guardian weekly*, which you kindly send to me."—*Rudolf Schmidt, Berlin.*

"Unfortunately there is no prospect of my being able to attend. As for a message, what I have specially in mind is a statement giving an outline of the work of the N.S.W. League in securing adoption of local taxation on land values in N.S.W. I want all the members of the Conference to get it . . . Like you in England we have a tragedy of a Labour Party Government in Australia. They in Australia are rank frauds trading in the name of 'Labour.' It is a very good catch-cry; in practice they are Tories. Our trouble is the alternative which is also Conservatism, as with you. Probably our Labour Government will go out at the next election towards the end of the year. The only Premier in 50 years that I can look back to with pride and admiration was J. H. Carruthers, who passed our Local Government Act."—*A. G. Huie, Sydney.*

"Glad to be a member of the Union and of the Conference, As one enrolled, regretfully I cannot be present. I have made the principal reason of my existence the task of spreading the teachings of Henry George. I believe that this is the most noble activity to which any man could dedicate himself, because peace and harmony will not be possible without acceptance of the principles set forth by the Prophet of San Francisco in his immortal book, *Progress and Poverty*."—*E.
