MICHAEL FOOT (England), b. 1913. English politician and writer, leader of the Labour Party 1980-1983. President of the Thomas Paine Society, UK.

IAN DYCK (Canada), 1954-2007. Professor of History in Saskatoon and Lethbridge and from 1988 at Simon Fraser University. Writer and editor of books, including *Citizen of the World: Essays on Thomas Paine* (1988) and *William Cobbett and Rural Popular Culture* (2005), as well as collections, articles, and reviews. Outstanding teacher.

DAVID BRAFF (United States), b. 1947. Background and involvement in history and world affairs.

ERIC FONER (United States), b. 1943. Historian, Professor of American History at Columbia University, former president of the Organization of American Historians and president of the American Historical Association. Among his many books are *Tom Paine and Revolutionary America* (1976) and *Paine: Collected Writings* (1995). His father was historian Jack D. Foner and his uncle was Philip S. Foner to whose *Life and Major Writings of Thomas Paine* and *Complete Writings of Thomas Paine* (1945) several of the presenters refer.

CHARLES FRANCISCO (United States). Popular television actor in the 1960s. Author of several books, including *David Niven: Endearing Rascal* (1986).

BERNARD VINCENT (France). Professor Emeritus at the University of Orléans. Author of *The Transatlantic Republican, Thomas Paine and the Age of Revolutions* (2005).

CLIVE PHILLPOT (England, United States). Born in England, came to the US and became director of the Museum of Modern Art library in New York City, then returned to England as a freelance writer and art library and archive consultant. Author of essays about artists and their work.

PAUL O'DWYER (Ireland, United States), 1907-1998. Progressive lawyer and activist, involved in New York City politics and in workers'

rights and civil rights in the US and elsewhere, including republicanism in Ireland. He served as president of the New York City Council (1974-1978) and, as he mentions, received the Thomas Paine Award from the National Emergency Civil Liberties Committee.

SEAN WILENTZ (United States), b. 1951. Historian and Professor of History at Princeton University. His scholarship has focused on the early years of the American republic, including a major study, *The Rise of American Democracy: Jefferson to Lincoln* (2006). Also a social/political commentator on current issues, contributing to *The New Republic* and *Rolling Stone*.

DAVID HENLEY (United States). Thomas Paine historian. Major participant in the Thomas Paine National Historical Association and to Thomas Paine Friends, making presentations and contributing articles on current Thomas Paine research and commemorations, as well as on other free thinkers in the spirit of Thomas Paine.

ROBERT MULLER (Belgium/France, United States, Costa Rica), b. 1923. Served forty years at the United Nations, rising to Assistant Secretary-General. Called the 'Prophet of Hope' of the UN and the 'father of global education,' having developed a 'World Core Curriculum' that is taught in Robert Muller schools around the world. In an active retirement, he has served as Chancellor of the University for Peace created by the UN in demilitarized Costa Rica. He has written many books, including *Most of All They Taught Me Happiness* (1978 and 2005). With his wife Barbara, Muller has a daily (M-F) 'GoodMorning' email message for creating a better world. ZOFIA LIBISZOWSKA (Poland). Historian and writer, whose works include *Tomasz Jefferson* (1984) and various contributions to the understanding and influence of Thomas Paine.

JOYCE CHUMBLEY (United States). Employment Specialist for Older Workers, Independent Researcher and Writer, Climate and Environmental Campaigner, Arts Council Director, Educational Consultant, College Instructor, and Dean ... idea composter ... co-learner ... wholistic networker ... impresaria of celebrations ... globalist.
