concentrate on his work for the Centre for Land Policy Studies and has resigned from the editorship of the magazine.

Throughout, Fred has given us his best professional experience, learnt as a national newspaper journalist and editor. The Foundation and Land & Liberty have drawn on his many contacts, and the interest created by his writings and publications. He has brought us a deep knowledge of the economic and political importance of the role of rent, of its producers and appropriators, and of the dramatic impact that the struggle for rent has had on human history and culture. This now seems a good moment to reaffirm the purpose for which Land & Liberty exists, and our commitment to it.

The Henry George Foundation intends that Land & Liberty should speak not just for itself or for the Foundation, but be a principal means by which the global Georgist movement increases understanding of its philosophy among key opinion formers worldwide, especially where there is political transition.

Consequently, it is addressed to those who may never have heard of the ideas and beliefs of Henry George. It seeks not only to analyse current political concerns, but also to provoke new areas of debate. The articles will continue to be well informed about the issues that engage people generally, and our presentation and language aim to be accessible to any reader.

To help us with this we have taken on the services of the publishing firm Wrap, who began a redesign of the magazine, working with Fred, on the last issue.

We hope you like the changes and the Henry George Foundation will be using Wrap's expertise to promote Land & Liberty much more widely.
