SAN DIEGO has spirited away one of HGN's most loyal contributors, Clayton C. Bauer, formerly a resident of New York State. He is the new extension director with headquarters at 3627 30th Street, San Diego 92104. In his new capacity he will be sharing in the enthusiasm which we associate with the wonderful group of Southern California Georgists whose hospitality at former conferences is so well remembered. Three new evening classes have begun at headquarters on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, billed as "Get-more, Keep-more" Basic Economics.

CHICAGO again set up the most striking mayorial proclamation for Henry George Day, September 2nd. The text was prepared by Robert A. King who wonders why others do not join him in presenting drafts for their mayors to sign. In a large three-column space this proclamation was reproduced in the Chicago Gazette, along with a note about Wilbur Johnson. He conducts "The Needle" to establish "irrefutable scientific proof that Henry George provided the one and only correct resolution to the majority of our social problems." This is proudly hailed in the Gazette as "another first for a black man."

Mina Olson, who attended the conferences in Europe, is Executive Secretary of the HGS and membership chairman of the Henry George Woman's Club which may expand into a national organization. Annual dues for regular members will be \$5, for associate out-of-state members, \$2.50. Regular members and out-of-state members will receive The Henry George News as a bonus. Extension directors in need of

volunteer help should cooperate with this venture—never under-estimate the power of Georgist women.

NEW JERSEY headquarters have been moved from Newark to 149 South Harrison Street, East Orange, 07018, telephone 201-672-0313 and a big celebration is being planned for this month or next. The new premises adjoin Hotel Suburban and are convenient to public transportation and parking. The space will include offices and a large assembly room for classes and other functions. The basic course and two advanced courses have begun at the new headquarters. No tuition is charged but there is an enrollment fee of \$2 which includes the required textbooks. The director, John T. Tetley, has found a new label for the basic course, he calls it "A Different Way to View Economics.'

A new trustee, Ellwood A. Shepherd, was elected to succeed Alvin L. Searles, a valued board and faculty member, whose death is deeply felt.

NEW YORK headquarters, still in the process of extensive redecoration, is welcoming new students to 15 classes (English), 12 in Basic Economics, 2 in Applied Economics and one in Economic Science. The faculty members are enjoying the sessions in Survey of Economic Thought with William L. Hall, HGS staff executive, as leader.

Basic Economics is being offered to Spanish speaking members in the diplomatic service, and a Spanish class in Applied Economics is also on the agenda.

Regional classes in the above two courses begin on October 9th in the Jackson Heights Public Library.
